I tried to reason with him for over two hours but could not. His wife came to the station at 4 P.M. and asked me to protect her and boy I took them in the station and at 7:30 P.M. he came after her and came the back way with the gun and started to get her she ran out of doors I and my wife and Mrs. Cook held him <sup>until his wife got away</sup> and he was <sup>then</sup> being <sup>around</sup> at that time could not do nothing with him he came at with his gun in hand until 11:30 and then went back to his house I kept watch all night think <sup>ing</sup> he might set fire to some of the buildings.
